b. Update about Johnson County Economic Development Committee

Luke from PDS interested in doing some research on economic development opportunities for local foods. Assessing what properties that we currently have that can be used for value-added agricultural projects.

- C. Pat Heidan: The JC Admin Building is open by appointment. Addressing BLM issues. Kristy shares that it is difficult to hear the BOS members on the phone, so concerned about public hearings occurring virtually.
- 7. Discuss Impacts of HF 2477 and 2512 on Unified Development Ordinance (6:20 PM)
- JC Code is not current with state law. Staff and Board of Supervisors are looking to allow Ag Experience legally.
- 2477: This change removed the ability of the County to permit uses that previously required a conditional use permit. This law did not make agricultural experiences a permitted use, it only removed the ability of the county to permit them as currently structured.

On all points of the UDO, The JCFPC has provided feedback. Do we want to provide feedback to the latest news?

The BOS plans to amend UDO to remove seasonal ag events, classes, etc. Add permitted use of ag experiences, a list or a definition that would be permitted uses with supplemental conditions which could include dust control, public health compliance, parking issues, etc.

Question: What direction will landowners receive for permitted uses with supplemental conditions?

Pat; If you are proceeding in good faith, no punitive actions from PDS or Johnson County, we support Ag experience. If someone is not in compliance, we will work with you to get you in compliance.

Molly: Agritourism and Ag experience are thrown out a lot and I want to say yes to both and what is near and dear to me with this change; there are essential parts of agricultural businesses that no longer need a permit. It goes beyond Ag Tourism and Ag experience; it is essential to connect the community with agriculture.

Kristy- Walker Homestead is lucky got permits in but Colony Pumpkin Patch is not so lucky.

Katie Colony: We don't understand where there is a question, where there is an issue. The way we read this is we are not required to be permitted, we wouldn't be considered illegal when we open. But because PDS/ BOS do not feel that way, we are in a terrible situation. With COVID, no matter what kind of agritourism, we have to do all these extra things. We don't want any issues. Glad to hear we won't be closed down. But we will have more hoops, more discussion. We waited because we don't have the extra \$500 for one event we would need a permit for.

Pat: From my vantage point,. embracing local foods and small farmers it is in the UDO it has been an initiative and we need to talk the talk and walk the walk; be sure we get where we want to be and support one another. People are concerned My commitment in that we the county, we are embracing, we support in any way that we can. If you are not in compliance, we will help get you from a to b and not put up road blocks. I hear you.
