SNAP/FOOD STAMPS

SNAP benefits, the new name for food stamps, can help put healthy food on the table by providing monthly assistance to purchase food at authorized grocery stores and farmers' markets. Benefits are provided monthly through a plastic benefit card, similar to a debit or credit card.

TERMS

EBT

Stands for
Electronic Benefit
Transfer. It's the
system the
government uses to
disburse benefits.

SNAP

Stands for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. "SNAP benefits" is the same thing as "food stamps."

WHAT SHOULD I KNOW?

- ➡ Employment may not interfere with getting SNAP. Even if you are working, but earning low wages, you may be eligible.
- Average SNAP benefits are over \$100 per person per month, and \$250 or more for families. That means that SNAP benefits for the average family receiving them totals more than \$3,000 worth of food support each year.
- → lowa City farmers' markets accept SNAP benefits, so you can purchase fresh produce using your benefits. For a complete list of farmers' markets that accept them, see page 11.

AM I ELIGIBLE?

SNAP Eligibility is based on household size, income, expenses and other factors. Households have to meet income tests to receive benefits, but households that have members who are disabled or elderly (60 or older), or have out-of-pocket expenses for child care or dependent care, can have higher incomes and still be eligible.

If you meet the above income qualifications, it doesn't matter how much money you may or may not have in countable resources. In other words, you can save money for education, a home purchase, or retirement and still receive SNAP benefits.

IMMIGRANT ELIGIBILITY FOR SNAP

Legal immigrants can often receive SNAP benefits if they:

- have lived in the country for 5 years or more; or
- are children (ages 18 or under).
- → Ineligible immigrant parents can still receive benefits for their children even if a parent does not qualify.
- → Certain non-citizens, such as those admitted for humanitarian reasons, may also be able to receive benefits.
- → Immigration status is not negatively affected if you apply for or receive SNAP benefits.

WIC is The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children. WIC provides nutritious food and baby formula, health screenings, education, and breastfeeding support. Food is purchased at a store using a benefit card.

QUICK FACTS

- ➡ WIC is for low-income pregnant women, breastfeeding or had a baby or miscarriage in the past 6 months, and children up to the age of five.
- You can work and still get WIC (though there are eligibility guidelines based on family size and gross income)
- → You can continue to get cash assistance or SNAP benefits food stamps while receiving WIC.
- ➡ Immigrant eligibility: You can get WIC even if you are undocumented or not a citizen.

HOW TO APPLY FOR WIC

Call the Johnson County WIC Clinic to schedule an appointment.

Be sure to bring the following to your appointment:

- proof of income or Medicaid card
- proof of your address
- proof of identity for each family member applying to WIC

SCHOOL AND SUMMER MEALS

QUICK FACTS

- → Youth may be eligible for free breakfast before school during the school year. Check your local school for eligibility criteria.
- → Many public school students are also eligible for free or reduced price lunch. An application may be required. Eligibility for school meals is **not** impacted by immigration status.
- → In June, July and August, lunch and breakfast are served for free to all children under 19 at many public schools, houses of worship, recreation centers, and community centers - no application or registration required.
- → Backpack programs are offered at some elementary schools in Johnson County to supplement free and reduced lunch foods over the weekends. The program provides single-serving foods to students in a backpack they take home.
- Contact your school's Family Resource Center or Student Family Advocate to learn more information about school breakfast and lunch programs, and to see if your school offers a backpack program.






